

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Section 1

Schools in Suffolk

All schools in Suffolk are day schools for boys and girls of all abilities. The age range of pupils varies, depending on which part of Suffolk they are in. Further information can be found in the booklet 'Admissions to Schools in Suffolk 2015/2016'. This is available by contacting the Admissions Team or online at: www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissionstoschools.

Suffolk County Council deal with applications for the normal year of entry for all types of schools, acting on behalf of the governors/academy trusts in the case of voluntary aided, foundation/trust, academy and free schools.

From September 2015, voluntary aided, foundation/trust, academies and free schools will deal directly with their in-year applications. Suffolk County Council will continue to deal with applications for community and voluntary controlled schools.

Key admission dates

It is very important that you apply by the closing date for the normal year of entry. Late applications will not normally be considered until after school places have been offered to those who applied on time.

Timetable for applications to the normal year of entry at upper and high schools in September 2015	
Friday 12 September 2014	If you are a Suffolk resident you can apply online or fill in a CAF1 paper application form for a school place.
Friday 31 October 2014	Closing date for upper and high school applications for September 2015.
Tuesday 6 January 2015	If we agree that there are very exceptional reasons for an application being late we will consider it as on time if it is received by this date and evidence is provided with your application. For example, if you are moving house and we have received written evidence that you are legally committed to your move and that the move will take place before your child starts at the school.
Monday 2 March 2015	For on time applications, a letter will be posted to you with the offer of a school place. If you applied online we will also email you the offer of a school place.
After Monday 2 March 2015	We will consider all other late applications.
Friday 13 March 2015	We will assume that you have accepted the place offered, unless you let us know in writing by this date.

Full details of the admissions timetable for the 2015/2016 school year can be found in the secondary co-ordinated admissions scheme for upper and high schools in Suffolk, which is available online at: www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissionstoschools. Section 2

How school places are offered

Community and voluntary controlled schools

We offer a set number of places in any one year. This number is known as the Published Admission Number (PAN), which is based on a national formula for deciding how many children can go to a school, without causing overcrowding.

Although the PAN applies to the year of entry we would normally apply this number across all year groups in the school. However, there may be occasions for other year groups where it is not possible to do so.

If the number of applicants is less than the PAN all applicants will be admitted. For any preferred schools, there may be more applications for that school than there are places available. If the number of applications for a school is greater than its PAN, we use our admissions oversubscription criteria to decide who gets a place.

Voluntary aided, foundation/trust, academies and free schools

The governing bodies/academy trusts rank the application according to their oversubscription criteria. For the normal year of entry, Suffolk County Council co-ordinates all applications for children who live in Suffolk and will write directly to you on behalf of the governing body/academy trust.

For in-year applications the governing body/academy trust will decide if a place can be offered in the relevant year group. They will write to let you know their decision. The school must let Suffolk County Council know you have applied for a place and the outcome of the application. If the school is unable to offer a place you should contact the Admissions Team (contact details on page 2) to see which schools have places available.

Where a voluntary aided, foundation/trust, academy or free school has their own admissions oversubscription criteria this is displayed underneath the school details in this directory.

The wording in this booklet may be a summary of the full admissions policy. Therefore you must refer to the school's own full admissions policy, which sets out how places will be prioritised. You can get a copy of the full policy from the school or online at: www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissionstoschools.

If you are applying for a place at a voluntary aided, foundation/trust, academy or free school you may also need to complete a Supplementary Information Form (SIF) and send it directly to the school.

There is a separate directory for the oversubscription criteria for primary, infant, junior and middle schools.

How the allocation process works	
Step 1	If we can meet your first preference, we will offer you a place at that school.
Step 2	If we cannot meet your first preference but can meet your second preference, we will offer you a place at that school. For the normal year of entry only, we will also place your child's name on the waiting list for your first preference school.
Step 3	If we cannot meet your second preference but can meet your third preference, we will offer you a place at that school. For the normal year of entry only, we will also place your child's name on the waiting list for your first and second preference schools.
Step 4	<p>If we cannot meet any of your preferences, we will offer you a place at your catchment area school (if you have not included it in your preferences and if there is still a place available there) or at the next nearest school which has a place available. This will take into consideration the availability and cost of home to school transport.</p> <p>The next nearest school is measured by walking distance. Walking distance is from the front door of the home to the nearest school gate. Where there is more than one home within a single building (for example apartments) we will measure from the main entrance of the building.</p> <p>For the normal year of entry only, we will also place your child's name on the waiting list for your first, second and third preference schools.</p>

Admissions oversubscription criteria

If there are more applications than places available the following oversubscription criteria shows the order of priority for places at community and voluntary controlled schools (and at those foundation/trust, academies and free schools where they have agreed to use Suffolk County Council's oversubscription criteria).

For applications to the normal year of entry at a school, these criteria will be applied according to the circumstances existing on or before the closing date.

We will offer you a school place on the following basis:

Children who have a statement of Special Educational Needs (SEN) or an Education, Health and Care plan (EHC plan) which names the school must by law be offered a place at that school.

- 1 Looked after children (children in care) and previously looked after children (children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted or became subject to a residence order or special guardianship order, immediately following having been looked after).
- 2 Siblings (children who are brothers and sisters of, or who live as a family at the same address) of pupils who are already at the school or who have already been offered a place, and who will still be there at the time of admission (but not in the sixth form). Priority will be given, where necessary, to applications where there is the smallest age gap. If you have more than one child at the school, please name the youngest one.
- 3 Children who are ordinarily resident in the catchment area.
Places will be allocated in the following priority order:
 - a) If the school is voluntary controlled, children whose parents/carers are applying on the grounds that the child and/or the family are practising members of the Church of England. (You must provide a letter at the time of application from a priest or minister. This letter must specifically state that you and/or your child are a practising member of the Church of England and that you and/or your child go to church regularly, that is to say at least once a month).
 - b) Children who live nearest to the school. We will measure the distance by a straight line ('as the crow flies'). All straight line distances are calculated electronically by Suffolk County Council using data provided jointly by the Post Office and Ordnance Survey. The data plots the co-ordinates of each property and provides the address-point between which the straight line distance is measured and reported to three decimal places. Where there is more than one home within a single building (for example apartments) we will measure to a single point within that building irrespective of where those homes are located.
- 4 Children who live outside the school's catchment area in the same priority order as set out in (a) and (b) above.

We will treat all your preferences (up to three) as equal. We will look to see if a place is available at each of your preferences and offer you a place at your highest preference school with a place available.

Notes:

Distance tie breaker

It is possible that the PAN of the school will be reached in any one of the categories. For this reason, all applications will be prioritised according to the rules described. Decisions will be made about the offer of places in accordance with those priorities. If it is necessary to use a tie-breaker to distinguish between two or more applications, a distance criterion will be used. We will give priority to the applicants who live nearest to the school as measured by a straight line.

In the unlikely event that two applicants competing for a single place at a school live the same distance from the school, the place will be offered to one applicant on the basis of lots drawn by an officer of Suffolk County Council not involved with admissions.

Twins, triplets and other multiple births

If the final place available at a school is offered to a twin, triplet or other multiple birth and the remaining sibling/s would ordinarily be refused, we will offer places to the remaining sibling/s at the same school.

Waiting lists

If you apply for a school place in the normal year of entry and one or more of your preferences are refused, your child's name will automatically be placed on a waiting list for these schools (as described in step 2 to step 4 on page 5). Names are placed on the waiting list in the priority order with reference to the school's admissions oversubscription criteria.

The order of children does not remain static – as circumstances change, a child's place on the waiting list can go up or down, for example, due to withdrawals or additional applications.

If you change your address while your child is on a waiting list you must let us know. Please be aware that this may change your child's position on the waiting list, particularly if you move into or out of the school's catchment area. Written evidence of this will be required.

Having your child's name on a waiting list will not affect your right to appeal for any of the schools you have been refused a place at. See the booklet '**Admissions to Schools in Suffolk 2015/2016**' for how to appeal.

Late applicants will be added to any waiting lists in oversubscription priority order if their parental preferences cannot be met.

If a place becomes available, we will offer it to children on the waiting list for that school in priority order. We do not offer places on the basis of the date on which names were placed on the list.

The waiting lists will cease to operate at the end of the first full week of the spring term (Friday 8 January 2016).

Suffolk County Council does not hold waiting lists for in-year applicants. Some voluntary-aided, foundation/trust, academies and free schools may hold waiting lists throughout the year for all year groups. This information is available from the schools directly.

Making another application for a place at the same school

A parent/carer can apply for a place for their child at any time to any school outside of the normal admissions round. However, if your application for a school place is refused, we will not determine a further application for a place in the same school in the same school year, unless there has been a significant change in the circumstances of the parent/carer, child or school. Such circumstances might be a house move or a place becoming available at the school.

If there is no significant change in circumstances, you can make another application for the following school year. However, this will not normally be considered more than one term ahead of the date when you want your child to start at the school.

Section 3

School details

Suffolk County Council makes decisions for community and voluntary controlled schools.

The governing bodies/academy trusts of voluntary aided, foundation/trust, academies and free schools determine the order in which applications should be ranked according to their oversubscription criteria. These are known as own admission authority schools.

More information is available in the booklet '**Admissions to Schools in Suffolk 2015/2016**'.

The following pages provide alphabetical lists of Suffolk upper and high schools, sixth form colleges, special schools and pupil referral units.

We have provided some key information about each school to help you when you are applying for a place, including:

- The school's address
- The school's website (if they have one)
- The age range and type of school
- Headteacher and phone number
- Specialism (if applicable)
- The Published Admission Number (PAN) for 2015/2016. This is the number of pupils who will be allowed to join the school in the year group.
 - * indicates that as the PAN for 2015/2016 is lower than the PAN for 2014/2015 you should be aware that places will be more limited and the pattern of admissions may change.
- The sixth form PAN for 2015/2016. This is the number of students who can be admitted from outside the school to Year 12 (that is to say, not including those students who transfer from Year 11 itself).
- The school's oversubscription criteria, if it is different to Suffolk County Council's oversubscription criteria which is on page 6 of this directory.

The wording in this booklet may be a summary of the full admission policy and therefore you must refer to the school's own full admissions policy which sets out how places will be prioritised. You can get a copy of the full policy from the school or online at: www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissionstoschools.

We have also included information relating to the on time applications we received for the normal year of entry to the school in September 2014 (2014/2015 school year). This is to help you judge whether or not your application for a school place in the entry year might be successful when you are filling in the application form. It includes:

- The Published Admission Number (PAN) for 2014/2015
- The number of pupils on roll at the school in May 2014
- The number of applications received by the closing date. This is the number of applications for which no higher preference school was offered. It may include second and third preferences as well as first preferences. The figure is intended to give you an idea of the demand for places at the school. Please note that if you only apply for schools that have previously had more applications than places, there is a possibility that you will not be offered a place at any of them.
- The number of places that were actually allocated at the school to on time applicants
- The number of on time applications that were refused
- The criterion under which the last child was admitted to oversubscribed schools. Where schools were not oversubscribed all applicants were admitted. Where schools were oversubscribed, the oversubscriptions criteria was applied and the cut-off point is indicated.

We have not included information on independent schools.

2015/2016 Oversubscription criteria:

After the admission of students with statements of Special Educational Needs where Beccles Free School is named on the statement, the criteria will be applied in the order in which they are set out below:

1. A "looked after child" or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, residence, or special guardianship order. A "looked after child" is a child who is;
 - a) in the care of a local authority, or
 - b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions ("looked after children" as defined in section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).
2. Children with a sibling attending Beccles Free School at the time of application. A Sibling is defined in these arrangements as children who live as brother or sister in the same house, including natural brothers or sisters, adopted siblings, stepbrothers or sisters and foster brothers and sisters.
3. Other children by distance from Beccles Free School, with priority for admission given to children who live nearest to the school as the crow flies. Distances are measured between the two full UK postcodes of the student's home and the school postcode using a website that calculates the distance up to three decimal places between the two points. Random allocation will be used as a tie-break in category '3' above to decide who has highest priority for admission if the distance between two children's homes and the school is the same.

2. Looked after children or children in Public Care are given priority in the oversubscription criteria;				
3. Children who live in the Bungay High School catchment area, who have a sibling at Bungay High School at the time of admission.

4. Children who live in the Bungay High School catchment area.
5. Children who have a sibling at Bungay High School at the time of admission.
6. Children who attend a primary school within the Bungay High School catchment area (Bramfield CEVC, Bungay, Edgar Sewter, Earsham CEVA, Holton St Peter, Ilketshall St Lawrence, St Edmund's Catholic Primary, Wenhaston).
7. Children who live nearest Bungay High School by the shortest straight line distance by measuring a straight line from the centre point of the home to the main pupil entrance to the school.

In cases of equal merit, priority will go to children living nearest the school according to the shortest straight-line distance. The distance, for admissions purposes, is measured using the straight line distance from the centre point of the home address to the main pupil entrance to the school.

2015/2016 Oversubscription criteria:

The following details the order of priority for places in the case of oversubscription:

1. Children who have a Statement of Special Educational Needs must by law be offered a place at their chosen named school and will therefore be offered a place at Castle Manor Academy or Place Farm Academy
2. 'Looked after children' and previously 'Looked After Children'. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of the local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions.
3. Children from the named local feeder primary schools, the Family of Schools using the following criteria;
 - a) Children with a brother or sister (sibling) attending Castle Manor or Place Farm at the time of application with a reasonable expectation they will be attending at the start of the new academic year. Attendance at Castle Manor Academy will also include the sixth form. Priority will be given, where necessary, to applications where there is the smallest age gap. If you have more than one child at the school, please name the youngest one.
 - b) For Castle Manor Academy: children attending one of the named local feeder schools, the Family of Schools, who do not have a brother or sister (sibling) attending Castle Manor. Priority will be given, where necessary, to applications where there is the smallest age gap. If you have more than one child at the school, please name the youngest one.
4. Children of staff employed by the school for two or more years or who meet a skill shortage.
5. Applications from children who do not attend a named local feeder primary school will be considered if there are still places available and will be determined by the following criteria:
 - a) Children with a brother or sister (sibling) attending Castle Manor or Place Farm at the time of application with a reasonable expectation they will be attending at the start of the new academic year. Priority will be given, where necessary, to applications where there is the smallest age gap. If you have more than one child at the school, please name the youngest one.
 - b) The distance criteria described in ' Tie-Breaker'.

The Tie-Breaker: In the event of oversubscription in any category outlined above, priority will be determined by the distance of the child's home to Castle Manor or Place Farm. This will be done by measuring the distance by a straight line ('as the crow flies'). All straight line distances are calculated electronically by Suffolk County Council using data provided jointly by the Post Office and Ordnance Survey.

2015/2016 Oversubscription criteria:

In the event of oversubscription of places, all pupils whose statement of special educational needs (or Education, Health and Care Plan) names the school will be admitted first before the use of the following criteria in descending order of priority.

1. Looked after children and children who were previously looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a residence order or special guardianship order).
2. Exceptional Medical Need:
Any such applications must be received by the closing date in the co-ordinated scheme and will be considered by the Admissions Committee of the school. The extent and circumstances in which medical need would override those above would relate to situations in which e.g. a hospital consultant has stated in writing that attendance at County Upper was essential in terms of meeting the medical needs of the child. Written supporting evidence must be provided by at least one registered health professional and must set out the particular reasons why placement at County Upper is essential.
3. Applications from children currently attending a Trust Middle School in the following order of priority:
 - a) Children with a brother or sister (sibling) attending a School working within the Academy Trust at the time of application with a reasonable expectation they will be attending at the start of the new academic year. Attendance at County Upper will include attendance in the Sixth Form.
 - b) Other Children.
4. Applications from children who do not attend a Trust Middle School in the following order of priority:
 - a) Children with a brother or sister (sibling) attending a School working within the Academy Trust at the time of application with a reasonable expectation they will be attending at the start of the new academic year. Attendance at County Upper will include attendance in the Sixth Form.
 - b) Home location using the proximity criteria described below in 'Tie-Breaker'.

Tie-breaker: In the event of oversubscription in any category above, priority will be determined by the proximity of the child's home to County Upper using a straight-line distance from the main entrance of the school on Beeton's Way to the main door of the child's residence, with those living the nearest to the school being given priority. All straight line distances are calculated electronically by the Local Authority using data provided jointly by the Post Office and Ordnance Survey.

Criterion under which last child admitted – B5 distance to school – see 2014/2015 policy			
2015/2016 Oversubscription criteria:			
Governors have a statutory duty to admit applicants with a statement of Special Educational Need where this school is named as being the best able to provide the most appropriate educational provision for the named child. They also have a statutory duty to give the highest priority to children who are in public care and to children who were previously in public care but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a residence order or special guardianship order). All other admissions are made by strictly applying the criteria below in priority order until the number to be admitted equals the PAN (125).			
Priority A – In Catchment Area Applications			
Places will be awarded on the basis of the following criteria and priorities;			
A1. Children of families who are ordinarily resident in the school's catchment area.			
A2. Those who have a brother or sister at the school who will still be attending the school at the time of admission. This includes half or step-brothers/sisters or other children living in the same household.			
A3. Those who regularly worship, or whose families (families in this context means one or both parents/carers/guardians) regularly worship (on average at least once per month) at a Christian church which is a member of Churches Together in Britain and Ireland or of the Evangelical Alliance.			
In order that the Governors have legitimate information on which to base a decision, applicants are asked to complete a Supplementary Information Form (SIF) if their application refers to this category.			
Priority B – Out of Catchment Area Applications

Section 4

How do I apply online for a school place in the normal year of entry 2015/2016?

You can apply online from 12 September 2014 at: www.suffolk.gov.uk/onlineadmissions.

Closing dates:

- Applications to upper and high schools for September 2015 must be completed and submitted **by midnight on Friday 31 October 2014**
- Applications to primary, infant, junior and middle schools for September 2015 must be completed and submitted **by midnight on Thursday 15 January 2015**.

Please see the **Directories of Schools in Suffolk** for school details, oversubscription criteria and how we offer school places. This is available online at: www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissionstoschools.

There are many benefits to applying online for a school place:

- It is safe and secure
- You will get an email confirmation that your application has been received
- There is no risk that your application will get lost in the post
- You can apply or change the details on your application on any day of the week. You must have completed and submitted your application by midnight on the closing date. Please allow sufficient time to register and complete your application if you are applying on the evening of the closing date.
- The system has a series of security procedures, which will prevent anyone seeing information they are not entitled to see.
- We will email you the offer of a school place on the offer date instead of waiting for a letter in the post
- If you do not have internet access at home you can use a computer at any Suffolk library.

How to apply

At the start of the online admissions process you will be asked to register and set up a password to allow access. If you have previously applied online you will have to register again to make an application.

If you live in Suffolk and your child is already at a Suffolk school you should have been sent a letter with a Unique Identifier (UID). This is helpful when you apply online (when you use it the computer fills in your child's details for you) but you can still apply online without one. If your details are incorrect please contact your child's current school.

Please take particular care to fill in all of the fields correctly because failure to do so may affect how your application is ranked.

In some circumstances, we need evidence to support your application. This would include:

- An adoption order, residence order or special guardianship order for a child who was previously looked after, immediately following having been looked after.

- A letter from a priest or minister to support an application based on religious grounds for a voluntary controlled school
- If you are planning to move house and you want your future address to be the one used to allocate a school place, you must give us written evidence that you are legally committed to the move and that it will take place before your child is due to start at the school you have applied for. This could be proof of exchange of contracts, a signed letting/tenancy agreement confirming your new address, an assignment order that declares a relocation date and a unit postal address or quartering area address for a service child, or, for returning UK Service/Crown Servant families proof of the posting. If you are unable to provide evidence of your move by the closing date, we will still be able to use your new address to rank your application if we receive sufficient evidence **by Tuesday 6 January 2015 for upper and high school applications or by Friday 13 February 2015 for primary, infant, junior and middle school applications.**

Unfortunately, you are unable to attach evidence to your online application. Therefore you will need to either email or post evidence to the Admissions Team (contact details on page 2) by the closing date. If you send information through the post we strongly suggest you get proof of posting.

If you are applying for a new school that has not yet received a unique number from the Department for Education you will have to fill in a CAF1 paper application which should include all of your preferences. We regret you will be unable to apply online.

You should keep the following information so you can check or change your online application at any time until the closing date. If you make any changes you will have to re-submit your application.

If your contact details change before the closing date you will need to update your registration details and your child's application in the case of an address change.

If your contact details change after the closing date you will need to update your registration details and email us separately with the changes. This is because you are unable to update your child's online application after the closing date. You do not need to let us know if you change your email address.
