

Freedom of Information – Response – 26838

I am scoping out the current landscape, to understand how community reparations are being used within each of Youth Justice Services. I have found very little information noting these ongoing efforts, and I think it is highly valuable to be able to compare the efforts of each service.

To do this, I would like to request the following information:

A list of all activities used as community reparation (these can be established placements or activities completed by individual young people e.g litter picking, cooking for charity sales, woodwork, sports coaching, chores at home, letter writing etc.)

Activities used as community reparation include the following:

- Reparation in children's homes – (i.e. – *decorating, cooking family meals*)
- Painting decorating/brightening up spaces (children's centres & more recently Youth Justice Service front office space area)
- Charity Fundraisers (i.e. charity bake sales, supported fundraising for hospice, made props for Halloween event to raise money for SAVA)
- Cooking including for the street homeless – Adventures in Outreach & cooking within children's homes
- Helping with Positive Futures sports sessions (sports coaching)
- Arts/Craft/building/making Activities (i.e.-Helped to build gym equipment for a local community centre)
- Group gardening project at a children's home to revamp the garden space.
- First aid courses
- Dog walking (for vulnerable/elderly people)
- Direct reparation to victims to repair harm (one recent example – two children attended a Restorative Justice Conference and then also supported direct reparation at the farm who were the victims afterwards – litter picking)
