# WHAT ARE RNRs?

RNRs are stretches of roadside verges that support populations of **rare** and **unusual** plants and fungi. Many roadside verges are very old and on the edges of routes that have changed little over the centuries.

These verges are the remains of the semi-natural grassland that was once widespread throughout the country, but which has **declined by 98% since 1945**, due to changes of **land use**, **intensive cultivation and drainage.** 

By careful management of these sites we aim to **preserve the species** on RNRs, giving future generations the chance to enjoy these remnants of ancient grassland meadows.

## WHAT DOES A WARDEN DO?

### **RAKING:**

Once an RNR has been cut, the thatch of mowings should be removed to take the nutrients off.

### **KEEPING AN EYE ON THE VERGE:**

If you notice anything happening to your verge such as material being dumped, or the marker posts being damaged please let us know!
