

Community Risk Management Plan 2023-2027

Community risk planning is a requirement under the Fire and Rescue Service National Framework 2018, produced by the Home Office and supported by the National Fire Chiefs Council (NFCC). The framework requires every fire and rescue service to identify all foreseeable fire and rescue related risks and explain how the Service intends to use their resources to respond to, and reduce, the risk they have identified within their area. The plan is subject to Public Consultation, and we are asking for your views on our proposals for changes to emergency response in Suffolk.



Risk in Suffolk

Suffolk covers **1,466 sq miles**. The population is over **761,000**



78% of Suffolk Residents between 16-64 were in employment in 2021 There are 4 Piers in Suffolk
Felixstowe, Southwold
And 2 in Lowestoft

349,940 homes in Suffolk with many thatched properties in the county and 44,510 flats/maisonettes

24% of Suffolk's population are over 65 compared to 19% nationally with this number set to increase. One third of the population live in the three largest towns, Ipswich, Bury St. Edmunds and Lowestoft

Suffolk road network totals
4,300 miles with 55,000
vehicles travelling
over the Orwell bridge daily.

A large scale flood risk exists from costal inundation and rivers Orwell, Gipping, Stour, Deben, Alde, Blyth and Waveney

Suffolk residents live longer than the England average and females live longer than males. Life expectancy at birth in 2018-20 was 84

Over 50 miles of coastlines and estuaries support recreational and commercial water use. The **Port of Felixstowe** remains one of Great Britain's and Europe's **busiest container port.**

Sizewell hosts one live nuclear power station and the site of the future Sizewell C. Climate changes leading to more extreme weather, storms and heatwaves, increasing risks of wildfires.

Risk Management

Prevention

Our Prevention team ensure that our prevention activities are directed to those who are most at risk, aiming to stop fires and incidents from happening in the first place via safe and well visits, campaigns, community engagement, courses and youth activites.

Protection

Our Protection team help those responsible for buildings to meet legal safety standards and protect their businesses from fire. We monitor and support with our risk-based inspection programme and building planning consultation work.

Response

Our firefighters ensure that we can respond quickly, safely and effectively to every emergency. We plan, prepare and train for a variety of emergencies including fires, flooding, road traffic collisions, specialist rescues and incidents involving hazardous materials.

- On-call firefighter recruitment, retention continues to be a challenge.
- Recruitment and retention of specialist support staff.
- Extreme weather events and climate change with predicted increased flooding and wildfire risks.
- Our ageing population and increased vulnerability will need greater support.
- Growing population leading to increased housing projects and infrastructure changes.
- Sizewell C development, with plant and infrastructure requirements impacting our county.
- Alternative energy source production, off shore wind farms, solar farms and Battery Energy Storage sites.
- Increased electric vehicles on our roads.
- High Bay warehousing construction along the A14 corridor.

- 2. Review our Emergency Response Fleet.
