Burlington Church Drop-In Event success


Thank you to those who attended the recent event at Burlington Church in Ipswich, on 21 July.

The Drop-in event offered the opportunity for Ukrainian guests to get one-to-one support on a range of issues, including housing applications, employment and benefit advice, Independent Living Payments, language learning and general support, to help them continue their journey in the UK.

The event was a huge success, with over 40 Ukrainian guests supported. The team received some very positive feedback, including a special thank you to Matt in the Homes for Ukraine team, from one young Ukrainian guest, who drew the picture below to say thank you for the help provided to their family – thank you!

The event was hosted by Together for Ipswich and attended by Suffolk County Council, Ipswich Jobcentre, Suffolk Refugee Support, Community Action Suffolk, Ipswich Borough Council and Anglia Care Trust.

Reminder: Support for Ukrainian refugees moving to private rented accommodation

In May, Suffolk County Council announced a one-off £2,000 support grant for Ukrainian refugees moving on from their host into their own accommodation.

The Independent Living Payment is available to any Ukrainian Refugees, moving into private rented accommodation after 1 April 2023. Guests must have been living in Suffolk for a minimum of two months and be registered on the Suffolk Homes for Ukraine scheme to be eligible for the payment.

The funding can be used for any associated housing costs, including furniture, moving costs or travel to work. The support can be used towards accommodation which is furnished or unfurnished, and accommodation can be in Suffolk or out of county.

Ukrainian guests can apply for the Independent Living Payment by <u>visiting the Information</u> for Guests page on the Suffolk County Council website and completing the application form.

Application forms can also be requested by emailing refugeesupport@suffolk.gov.uk

Please note that applicants must provide a copy of their tenancy agreement for the property they are claiming for, in order to receive the support.



Could you help a family in need?



We need new hosts to support Ukrainian guests who have been in the UK for 6 months or more, but are not ready to move to independent private rented accommodation.

Following feedback from Ukrainian guests, Suffolk County Council is seeking hosts in the larger towns across Suffolk, such as Ipswich, Bury St Edmunds or Lowestoft, or in other towns which have good transport links to enable those guests who have found employment to be able to travel to work.

Driving licence requirements in Great Britain

If you are a Ukrainian national living in Great Britain (GB) on one of the Ukraine visa schemes, you can drive in GB without exchanging your Ukrainian driving licence for up to 3 years after becoming a resident.

This applies to licences that permit the driving of:

- cars up to 3,500kg
- motorcycles

This law came into effect on 7 July 2023.

If you have already exchanged your Ukrainian driving licence for a GB licence, you can continue to use your GB licence under its current terms and conditions.

If you stay in GB for more than 3 years, you will need to exchange your Ukrainian driving licence for a GB licence.

If you have transferred to a different visa

You can use your Ukrainian driving licence for 3 years from when you became a resident in GB if you entered:

- on a Ukraine scheme visa, but within 3 years transfer to a different visa, such as a skilled worker visa
- after February 2022 and transfer onto a Ukraine visa scheme

How to exchange a Ukrainian driving licence

You must exchange your Ukrainian licence within 3 years. You can do this at exchange a

foreign driving licence.

Your licence should arrive within 3 weeks if you apply online. It may take longer

if DVLA needs to make additional checks.

If you passed your driving test before 28 December 2021

You can only exchange your driving licence for a UK licence that allows you to drive

automatic vehicles. You will need to take a driving test for manual cars to keep driving

these vehicles.

If you passed your driving test on or after 28 December 2021

If your current licence allows you to drive manual cars, you can exchange it for

a UK licence that allows you to continue driving manual cars.
