

PRIORITY 1 Effective and timely school improvement

AT AGE 5

71.1% of 5 year old children in Suffolk achieved a **Good Level of Development** at the end of Early Years Foundation Stage compared to 70.7% nationally. **Up 3.5% since 2015**

PRIORITY 2 Strong school to school support

School to School Support Partnership website launched to share best practice. **8400** visitors **196** case studies

Number of Teaching Schools doubled. **10**

Schools that have received school to school support for teaching and learning have moved from **12% below the national at KS2 to being in line.** **53 schools** that have received support have increased **KS2 reading, writing, maths outcomes** by 15%, compared to 8% nationally.

1st Research School in the East of England.

1st Early Years setting to become an Opportunity Area Research School.

£130k awarded by the Raising the Bar Challenge Fund to over 124 schools for evidence-informed programmes.

400 teachers and teaching assistants were trained in research-led approaches.

96% of survey responses said the programme had measurable and positive outcomes for children (July 2017).

PRIORITY 3 Excellence in leadership and governance

OVER 1,000 trainee teachers signed up to a mailing lists in 2015 and 2016 to receive regular updates about NQT jobs in Suffolk.

117 Graduate Interns recruited into primary schools in Suffolk between 2015 and 2017 – around half of these have gone onto teacher training.

Up to 200 new users visiting the Teach Suffolk webpages every week looking for information about getting into teaching and teaching careers.

GOVERN SUFFOLK SCHOOLS Governor recruitment campaign launched in 2017.

1,160 people have viewed the new GovernSuffolk webpages. **104** people registered interest in becoming a governor.

OVER 36,000 people reached with GovernSuffolk Facebook advertising. **2,400** governors receiving updates every month through our new e-newsletter 'Governor Headlines'.

PRIORITY 4 Developing aspirations with families, communities and businesses

£265,954 awarded by the Raising the Bar Community Fund to Voluntary Community Sector Projects.

36 projects supported **6,678** people expected to be impacted.

22 different industries featured. **74** employment sectors covered. **125,978** webpage views

Enterprise Advisor Network launched, strengthening links between schools and businesses
